Dear Friends,

Trinity is hosting many special events this month. On May 19th, Trinity is holding a Latin Nights Dinner and Auction Gala, which will include a live auction as well as a silent auction, a fantastic dinner, raffles, and music by the Tijuana Blast band. At the 10:00 am service on Pentecost Sunday on May 20th, we will welcome the families and friends of two members who will be baptized at the 10:00 am service on Pentecost. At a special combined morning service on Trinity Sunday, May 27th, we will be joined by The Rt. Rev. Bishop Greg Rickel, who will preside and preach at the service.

It feels like the wheel of the seasons has at last turned to a true spring and all of life is ready to celebrate. There is something to love in every season, and what I have appreciated over the past few days has been seeing the soft green of newly unfolding leaves on the trees. When the skies have been clear and the sun brilliant, I have enjoyed unfolding my sunglasses from where they have been stored in my glovebox for the past many months.

Driving through the countryside of Washington reminds me of all there is to be thankful for in life beyond myself. When the news of the world presses in, the freedom of driving in sunlight and wind in the midst of God's creation reminds me of all that is bigger and brighter. Even as my prayers are full of concern for victims of war, oppression and violence in nations far away and in our own country, my spirit is renewed by the fullness of beauty and promise that life finds a way. Even in the midst of rubble, in the trouble of our days, life reaches into our hearts and opens up a window through which the bird of the Spirit can fly free from its cage of mourning or worry or despair.

We were not made for despair. We were made for love. Sometimes the cage from which we must break free is the cage within our hearts that keep us from engaging others in ways that promise respect to those who have not known it, provide safety to those who are vulnerable, and reach out in genuine peace to those who fear that they will be met with intolerance. Messages from our own families of origin or messages that inundate us from the society and people around us can cage us within a sense of unworthiness such that we may not even value ourselves.

Diana Butler Bass is an author, speaker, and independent scholar specializing in American religion and culture. Recently, she shared that in these times, people frequently tell her stories of families and friendships that are frayed and broken because of political differences. She is struggling with this issue herself, in her relationship with her own brother. Diana asked, "[Are] any of you struggling with this? I'm at a loss as to what to do."

Though political differences are not the issue in my own family, this was the reply that I offered to the conversation:

I am an Episcopal priest in a birth family of atheists who tore me down every day of my life for years and still can when opportunity arises. I never discuss my beliefs, I never raise the topic of faith, and I don't have the expectation that they should believe as I do. When they get emotionally abusive or employ paternalistic sarcasm, it comes from their own discomfort. I sincerely just walk away to do something else. If they ask me a reasonable question, I answer; I'm glad to encourage genuine connection and relationship. I don't mount a defensive argument, and I don't return abuse with abuse. I just keep in touch, show my care of them, and focus on what's important to me without needing them to think it's important, too.

Love motivates my desire to be in relationship with family members who disagree with my beliefs. I want to be connected with them, and I know that even though we might want to wring each other's necks from time to time, when one of us is in true trouble, all the rest of us come to their aid without question and without condition.

By contrast, there are other families in which there is no underlying investment. Certain personalities may be narcissistic or bear no empathy whatsoever for any living thing, much less another relative. In such instances, remaining in such a relationship is likely not healthy and may lead to a grieving process that comes when we recognize that the relationship we wish we could have is never going to be possible.

Jesus acknowledged the difference between challenging relationships and relationships that simply do not exist, no matter how much we might want them to exist. He grieved for relationships that could not be had and "longed to draw all the world to himself," as we hear in our Eucharistic prayer at the time of communion. Yet, he was willing to do battle with Peter, even to forgive Peter's denial of Jesus at the end, because for Christ that was a relationship the two men actually very much wanted. The more we love one another, the greater the pain that can be caused when there are differences and when harsh words are exchanged. For example, "Get behind me, Satan!" is not exactly a loving verbal embrace.


What draws us together at the end of the day is the particular expression of love that we might call "gratitude." In spite of every hard time I have ever received from my family members, I'm glad that I have them in my life. I'm grateful for their vulnerability, for their talents and abilities, and for their commitment to being there for me when the going goes beyond "tough" and reaches "over the cliff crash and burn."

This summer, I will be leading a book study of Dianna Butler Bass' recently published book, *Grateful: The Transformative Power of Giving Thanks.* The book has been described as a text and model of resilience and resistance. Gratitude is good for our weary hearts and can support and restore our health in times of stress and worry. The book study series will be held on Wednesday evenings in June [6, 13, 20, 27] at 7:00 pm. The book can be purchased on Amazon or at Barnes & Noble. Please contact the church office if you need a copy of the book to be provided for you, if cost is an issue.

In the meantime, May is setting up to be a month of many celebrations of which to be grateful and opportunities to share our gratitude for the dedication of so many members of our community who are committed to supporting our fundraising efforts, our community gatherings, and our ability to baptize, confirm and welcome new members and friends into the continuing community of gratitude and love that is Trinity Episcopal Church.



FROM THE SENIOR WARDEN

It has been a month since we were together celebrating Holy Week and the Resurrection of our Lord on Easter Sunday. And yet today, I continue to feel the power from an amazing celebration of liturgy, music, and environment that so many people worked very hard to put together. So, I want to once more thank from the bottom of my heart the many groups and individuals who made it possible, from



our Altar Guild, Verger, Acolytes, Choir, Bell Choir, Children's Choir, Office Staff, late night volunteers, and of course Pastor Rachel. I will not stop there, I also want to thank every one of you who attended the Holy Week and Easter services, because each one of you makes our congregation special and each of you being present is what allows us as a parish to witness the love of god and the effort that all of our volunteers put together.

All this effort from our volunteers and the welcoming atmosphere that each one of you helps create is noticed by those who visit our church. I had the pleasure of receiving a letter after Easter from Maestro David di Fiore, who many of you will recognize as our guest organist this past Easter and someone who has joined us in the past for other occasions to share his wonderful talents with our congregation. With his permission, I am delighted to share this letter with the entire congregation as a reminder to all of us of the many blessings we have and share in our parish.

Dear Vestry,

I wanted to first thank you for the wonderful experiences I have had at Trinity, Everett, and especially to thank David Spring, and Reverend Rachel Taber-Hamilton for their amazing skills. I teach on the faculty of Catholic University in Ruzomerok, Slovak Republic. I teach organ, organ related worship courses, improvisation and choral conducting. Because my family lives in the Seattle area I have had the great pleasure, for two Christmas, and one Easter service, of collaboration with your highly skilled Music Director and superb Rector when I came to the area for a holiday visit.

Rachel is one of the best liturgists and preachers I have encountered in my very long career. I was involved in church music for about 55 years before I decided to devote the rest of my career to teaching and performing. I have been so impressed with her at the helm and want you to know that from an objective outsider, believe me when I say that you are beyond fortunate to have such a rector. In 55 years I have experienced some very good and some...well, shall we say, not so good pastors. Rachel is at the top for sure, being an impressive liturgist and engaging preacher. And I really loved the high church ritual she had designed but also the non-stuffy manner with which she presides. I don't think I will ever forget the baptismal renewal J. I admire her passion for social justice and the fact that she is sought after for leadership in the greater Episcopal Church, which also shows a high level of respect from her colleagues. Her welcoming personality and pastoral care are beyond

David has put together a wonderful music program, and has brought Trinity to a high level, which few churches will ever experience. When I direct the choir and they say to me, "we've heard this before" as I tell them about some vocal/choral technique, I know that they are in excellent hands. When I conducted, I was so happy that David was playing because he is a sensitive and intuitive accompanist, and I can concentrate on the choir and not have to be concerned about him because he knows my every move. His hymn playing is authoritative, and his conducting equally as good. His arrangements of hymns and work with the instrumentalists are inspiring, and his work with the children's choir delightful. His choice of choral repertoire is masterful and the visibility he has brought to Trinity's music program is a true gem. I noticed the large choir, which for sure is the mark of a fine director.

Your congregation is very friendly and I feel very comfortable and welcome when I am either playing/directing with David, or as a worshipper. I had friends visit on Easter Sunday, and they reacted exactly as I have.

TREASURER TIDBITS

I hope you all are enjoying an amazing start to Spring and are looking forward to summer. I know that this time of year, with the blooming flowers their aromas memories of days past often just waft into my mind and I start day dreaming about my summer vacation.

A huge thank you to all who are making their pledges faithfully each week and to those who are putting money in the plate every Sunday. Thanks to you, our pledge and plate/contribution income through 1st quarter is nearly right on track. We are running about 4.8% behind on income planned year to date (\$4,000). There are several reasons for this, but the bottom line is that if you have more you can give to support Trinity it will be appreciated beyond measure!.

You will remember that we approved up to a \$50,000 loan from the endowments for 2018. I am pleased to report that through 1st quarter we have only had to take \$5,000 of this (we were approved for \$12,500 per quarter).

This is amazing news. And if you think about our \$4,000 deficit in income for the quarter- if we could have gotten that in, we would not have had to borrow anything during the 1st quarter- or only \$1000. Either way- this is pretty amazing and God does provide.

We are now headed into the start of planning for the summer months, Rachel being gone for General Convention in July and travel time that takes us all away from our home Church. Please make sure you have your pledge/giving set up for automatic payments if possible so that our monthly expense can be met. Also, please pray about helping us close the gap in our income so that we can continue to not dip into our endowments.

With all vacation plans, I am sure we each are spending hundreds if not thousands of dollars on our time away. I humbly ask each of us to step back and compare what we are spending on a one time adventure compared to our annual pledge here at Trinity. Are you spending more on a one or two or three week vacation than you are giving annually to the Church that provides so much to each of us throughout the year? What if each of us re-allocated just a portion of our vacation funds to add to the plate or as a one-time special gift to Trinity this year or to increase our annual pledge? I suspect if every family, including my own, took just 10-20% of the allocated vacation money and gave that back to God, we would have not need to dip into our endowments for a loan. We would have no need to have conversations later in the year as we look at 2019 about do we cut the office hours and or music program to make the budget. We would likely have no need to look at do we have to find a different physical plant/location. We would likely be finding ways to spend money out in the community doing outreach that impacts humanity in and around our congregation.

So, my challenge to each of you is to take a look at what you are spending this year on your summer get away and really prayerfully compare this to what you are giving back to the God that is allowing you to take this outing or to look at your overall budget for eating out or getting coffee and compare this to what you are giving. Are we spending more on things that give us pleasure than we are on God? If so, how can each of us reprioritize this and increase what we are giving back to God and to Trinity.

Once all were settled, a Mariachi band provided a beautiful accompaniment for a not-so-solemn wedding procession, a brief ceremony, and a fiesta reception with dancing and toasts. There were tears of joy, laughter, and lots of connecting and re-connecting. The extremely friendly locals worked very hard to make the event special, and to treat all the guests like family.

That same hospitality toward all is one of the reasons I love visiting Mexico. They have gotten some bad press, and some politicians haven't been kind to the people there. 

That just shows what a big impact a simple blessed shawl can mean to someone.


